COMMITTEE REPORTS

NUCLEAR

Eyes on Pilgrim Update, February 20, 2019

New NRC rule loosens post-Fukushima requirements. After Fukushima, the NRC required nuclear power plants to modify elements of their design and structural safety mechanisms so as to diminish the risk of events not foreseen in the original design—events "beyond design"—including ways to address newly evaluated flood risks. But now, by a vote of 3-2, the NRC has approved revisions to the NRC's final rule. Most notably, the revision removes requirements to address seismic and flooding hazards.

Two of the five commissioners strongly disapproved of this change, as did the Union of Concerned Scientists: "... Owners have reevaluated seismic and flooding hazards. What they found is not reassuring. For instance, the flooding reevaluations revealed that roughly two-thirds of U.S nuclear plants face hazards beyond what they were originally designed to handle, including higher flood levels from extreme precipitation, upstream dam failure and storm surge." [...] "The commission majority's action today removed that requirement and will simply maintain the uncertain—and inadequate—status quo." Pilgrim is especially vulnerable to flooding due to heavy rains. Bottom line: Pilgrim's existing current licensing basis excludes heavy rainfall events despite evaluations using NRC-accepted methods that show such events to be the dominant flood hazard at Pilgrim.

Decommissioning plans being considered. Public comment solicited. The NRC is now considering the decommissioning plans from Entergy (current owner) and Holtec (would-be buyer). Between now and March 4th, the public is invited to make comments on each plan. Entergy's plan would defer full decommissioning until 2060. Among the dangers of this plan: (1) fuel rods would stay in the fuel pool for a long time, prolonging the risk of exposure to extreme weather, terrorism etc. (2) Recent reevaluations of the nature and degree of climate change have been largely ignored in Entergy's risk projections; nor does it enter into the NRC's calculations. Given extreme rains, storm surges and rising seas, Pilgrim's reactor could be water-compromised by 2060 (3) By 2060, all those now involved in the NRC, Entergy, the NDCAP and the federal government itself will be gone! How can we have any confidence that the basics of safety will be transmitted, understood and carried out between now and 2060?

Holtec, which will purchase Entergy (pending NRC approval) proposes a much rapider, six-year process. But this plan arouses serious concerns best expressed by our AGO at the NRC's annual meeting in January. "From the Attorney General's point of view, the proposed sale and the related transfer of license from Entergy to a Holtec subsidiary raise significant health, safety, environmental and financial concerns for the Commonwealth and its citizens. [...] Because of the significant risks to the Commonwealth ... we implore the NRC to join us in closely scrutinizing the proposal's terms and ensure that substance dial financial assurances exist to ensure those risks are fully addressed. To this end, the AG intends, on behalf of the Commonwealth, to intervene in the pending license transfer proceeding to articulate these and other concerns for evaluation by the Commission and the imposition of protective safeguards and other conditions with respect to any license transfer."

PILGRIM-RELATED LEGISLATION PROPOSED FOR THE 2019:

HD274 (*Meschino & LaNatra*) requires licensee funding offsite emergency planning post shutdown. **HD1077** (*Balser*) requires expansion of monitoring to 20 miles and emergency plans covering 50 miles, until all fuel rods have been removed from the fuel pool.

HD1746 (*Meschino & Cutler*) increases funding to MDPH for environmental monitoring—authorizing state to assess nuclear operator annually as a reserve to guarantee cleanup shortfalls until decommissioning is complete.

SD1064 (*Vinny DeMacedo*) & **HD 1752** (*Mathew Muratore*) protects taxpayers by authorizing state to fine Pilgrim's licensee in case of failure to clean up the site to a <10 ml/rem/year cleanup and < 4 ml/rem/yr. for drinking water sources water

SD598 (Patrick M. O'Connor) establishes Trust Fund to protect Commonwealth if decommissioning funds run short.

WHAT YOU CAN DO—Thank the sponsors of all this legislation and ask your representatives to support them.

AND, IN THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT: Senator Ed Markey and Representative William Keating have joined Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez in sponsoring the Green New Deal, which does not even mention nuclear energy. Its omission from the green new deal is being challenged by the nuclear industry, but also (sad to say) by many others, even on the progressive side (e.g. Cory Booker, Barack Obama, Bill Gates). Let Markey and Keating know what you think.

Finally, if you are a glutton for punishment, read the newly published exposé of the NRC by its former director turned whistleblower, Gregory B. Jazko, *Confessions of a Rogue Nuclear Regulator*. It is short, mordant and hair-raising, revealing all you suspected and more: one among the many examples of a federal bureaucracy entirely corrupted by corporate agendas.
